the competencies of English as a Foreign Language (EFL) Master's degree students at Med Seddik Benyahia University, Algeria.

In the last article by Oyeleke Oluniyi of Nigeria, it reviews the challenges and prospects of the transition of an existing part-time programme from a face-to-face model to an e-learning model at Obafemi Awolowo University. In particular, he noted technological access, quality and technical challenges associated with e-learning, especially for a developing country.

Given the geographical diversity of the contributors as well as the diverse selection of topics of interest, I do hope the reader will find the current issue an attractive and exciting reading.

I encourage reader to spread the words to colleagues to submit their article related to research in the area of online and distance education to the MJDE.
